Dear Friends,

Welcome to the September edition of our Circuit Chat – I hope that you enjoy reading it and catching up on the news from across the Trinity Circuit.

Thank you very much for the gift of a sabbatical. The three months gave me time to relax and live at a different pace, freed from my usual responsibilities, which I greatly appreciated. Here is a quick snapshot of some of the things that I did:

- Walked and geocached in local and holiday locations with my husband, Neville, and dog, Eddie.
- Stayed with family and friends in Uttoxeter, Swindon, Burton on Trent and London.
- Visited two of the churches that I served in previous circuits and worshipped in a range of different places of worship including one of the churches where my daughter is now minister it was a special moment to receive communion from her.
- Took part in a Scrap Glass Mosaic workshop in Sheffield.
- Knitted a scarf following the pattern published by Victoria Methodist Church in Bristol.
- Made time to go swimming regularly.
- Enjoyed reading novels by Alice McDermott and Ann Patchett.
- Went to various concerts and events.

As part of my research, I interviewed those involved in missional work at various Christian heritage sites including:

- Mount Zion Methodist Church near Halifax
- Englesea Brook Primitive Methodist Chapel and Museum
- The Rectory in Epworth

- Wesley Memorial Methodist Church in Oxford
- John Wesley's New Room Chapel and Museum in Bristol
- Tolpuddle Old Chapel
- Eyam Museum.

Whilst in Bristol I met with the Minister at Victoria Methodist Church, who had recently hosted the Methodist Art Collection, and then travelled to Plymouth to meet a Circuit Performing Arts Mission Enabler to discuss the opportunities that she had taken up to utilise the arts in worship and mission – these conversations gave me much food for thought.

I have also visited St Mary de Crypt in Gloucester, the Mayflower Exhibition at Gainsborough URC and Wesley's Chapel, Museum and House in City Road, London and chatted with the volunteers in those projects. It was good to spend time at Retford Library and the Nottinghamshire Archives to gain an awareness of the available resources for researching local church history. I have also familiarised myself with a range of online and written resources – like the website with details about Kiveton Park Circuit from 1918.

So, what are the outcomes of all of these visits? Well, I have collated a pictorial record of the heritage sites to help remind me of the key learning points/inspiration from each place. These pictures will form the basis of future talks and help me to share some key ideas for using heritage in mission (that is, in sharing faith, in worship, hospitality, education, tourism and family history research).

I've also been able to put together a set of cards which can be used to talk through the timeline of the Methodist Churches in Retford and the wider Circuit. I aim to share these with local members as an interactive exercise to explore the next steps that we could take together. I've identified some key questions to highlight in these conversations.

In summary, I now have a wide range of contacts and a better working knowledge of the key Methodist heritage sites – as well as a wish list of other heritage venues to visit in the future.

MEET AND MAKE GROUP AT NORTH ANSTON

Our new group Meet and Make first met in April when we welcomed people



from our community, other churches and our own church. It was a very informal time spent together, some knitting angels in preparation for distribution in our local area during Advent, some working on items they had brought from home, some starting mindfulness colouring and some just chatting while having a cuppa. Everyone enjoyed the time together and looked forward to meeting again the following month.

Then after the publication of the May Trinity Circuit Chat, which included our article about our 110th Church Anniversary banner and mentioning our new Meet and Make group, we received an email in connection with the Sheffield District Justice Quilt Project. We were advised that although the deadline had

passed a few squares were still required and were asked if we would consider it as our first project. Well, what a coincidence! When we first heard about the Justice Quilt Project earlier in the year, a decision had already been made to make our banner and, unfortunately, we felt we wouldn't be able to complete both in the time available. So, given this opportunity, the group discussed the possibility, and a decision was made



to go ahead with the suggestion.

At our meeting in June, we found a piece of blue material which measured a square of design was to be 9 inches square and as our theme was "fair access for all" a grid of nine equal squares was then marked out. We decided to use coloured felt for the cutouts of people, food and money.

On checking when the completed square was needed, we were advised that there were plans to take the guilt to the Methodist Conference meeting from 23 June. We quickly arranged an extra meeting and managed to finish the square. It was a bit of a rush, but we were pleased with what we had accomplished and look forward to seeing the completed quilt.

Our meetings are ongoing so if you can make time, please come and join us, you will be very welcome. We meet on the first Wednesday of each month from 2pm – 4pm.

Dave was an ideas man, someone who could dream big dreams and also see them through - he was a key founder of The Crossing Church and Centre from its inception and has been heavily involved and enabling others to continue the good work ever since. Dave was a keen presence at Wales Kiveton, and well-known and liked throughout the Circuit, always willing to play and lead in worship in different settings, and he made friends in Wales as well as Worksop.

Dave was a founder member of Ryton Chorale, having a lovely tenor voice himself, and accompanied various choirs and groups through the years.

At The Crossing he established (and re-established) a successful Praise Group with singers and musicians and is best known for his incredibly accomplished organ and piano playing. His enthusiasm never faltered, and he will be deeply missed. Without Dave we would not have The Crossing Church that we have today, and so many of us will continue his legacy by encouraging each other, exploring different forms of musical worship, and keep reminding ourselves that it is for God's glory and the community's sake that we keep going.

We learned at his Thanksgiving Service just what an academic and talented man he was in other ways - engineering, managing, imparting skills to others, as well as being a devoted husband, father and grandfather. to the disciples and other events up to Pentecost. Since then, we have had stories about Stephen, Philip and Saul, who became Paul.



Methodism began during the 18th century evangelical protestant revival. This was the time of the Agricultural Revolution, when there was rapid population growth and an increasing gap between rich and poor. It was also the beginning of the British Empire.

There was spiritual renewal across Europe and North America. Protestant denominations and church numbers increased. The Methodist Church grew out of the ministry of John and Charles Wesley, taking the gospel to those who were not part of the Church of England's parish system. They established local classes and


societies and organised a conference of those who followed their preaching.

In the 19th century, the Industrial Revolution brought more population growth and social change. There was urban growth and a further increase in the gap between rich and poor. The Methodist movement split into different churches. Legal restrictions against non-conformist Christians were removed and church numbers grew rapidly.

The Methodist Church also began missionary work across the British Empire, becoming a global church. The Church was active on social issues, including campaigning about the problems caused by alcohol, deprivation issues within cities, and for the establishment of trade unions.

At the start of the 20th century, the Primitive, Wesleyan and United Methodist

churches came back together, forming the current Methodist Church in 1932. The missions in cities developed a social work outreach. Overseas Districts become autonomous Conferences, working together through the World Methodist Council. Methodist Homes was established in 1943 and has become the largest charity care provider in the UK. The Methodist Church began the ordination of women in 1974. In 1978, the Methodist Conference declared racism a "direct contradiction of the Gospel of Jesus". From 1981, Methodist and Ecumenical Leadership Racism Awareness



Workshops began under the leadership of Sybil Phoenix and the Revd Vic Watson. The Methodist Community and Race Relations Committee was established in the 1980s. It became the Racial Justice Committee in 1995, then the Committee for Equality, Diversity and Inclusion in 2014, before the adoption of the Strategy for Justice, Dignity and Solidarity in 2021.

In 2003, the Methodist Church signed a Covenant with the Church of England with "the goal of full visible unity". The Methodist Church in Britain is now a multicultural church, with members who have come from the Methodist family from around the world.

In 2021 the church affirmed that there are two understandings of marriage and made practical provisions for both the view that marriage can only be between a man and a woman and the view that marriage can be between any two people. This has enabled same-sex marriages to be conducted in Methodist churches.

For John and Charles Wesley, good works were a core part of Christian living, along with prayer and Bible study. Caring for the poor, prisoners, widows and orphans was an important part of a Christian life. Methodists did not only care about welfare, they also aimed to ensure justice. John Wesley was influenced by Olaudah Equiano and his last known letter urged the abolition of "that execrable villainy" slavery. The Wesley's also influenced prison reform and, inspired by Susanna Wesley, were pioneers in education. John Wesley wrote about theology, politics, music, marriage, slavery and medicine.

Methodists were to work to improve the lives of others. John Wesley taught them to "Make all you can, save all you can, give all you can." Throughout its history, the

church has responded to the social problems of its day. In the 18th century, this included reaching out to those who were not part of the parish structure of the Church of England and faced legal restrictions and opposing slavery. In the 19th century, the Church campaigned against alcoholism and was active in forming trade unions.

Children's Homes were set up to provide for children living in the street and the charity National Children's Home (NCH) was founded in 1869. In the 20th century, there was social work outreach in cities and racism awareness work shops started in the 1980s. NCH became Action for Children, in recognition of the provision of a range of services to support children in the home.


Dinnington Community BBQ

Churches in Dinnington came together to host a free BBQ for the village on August bank holiday. Despite heavy clouds we were delighted to be joined by a wide cross section of the community. We lost track of how many people came, but our stock of 300 burgers and sausages were all eaten. The chapel was already filling up and buzzing with conversation half an hour before our advertised start. Our combination of posters, social media and word of mouth advertising had succeeded in reaching people. The few cakes left at the end of the afternoon, donated by a local supermarket, were passed on to the Salvation Army food bank.

As well as being a rare civic opportunity for people to gather, the BBQ was designed as an opportunity to ask people, and young people in particular, for their views on what Dinnington needs. Siggy Parratt-Halbert from the Learning Network joined us to encourage young people

to write their hopes on a series of graffiti boards she had





Dinnington is one of many neighbourhoods around us still scarred – a generation on – by pit closures, compounded by a decade of austerity and now the current cost of living crisis. In recent months the Methodist congregation has been facing up to challenging questions about

whether they can continue their current model of being church. The prospect of "giving up" on Dinnington felt uncomfortable, but maintaining the status quo is becoming a heavy burden.

Rev Angela Pothecary and members of the congregation began reaching out and speaking with local people, assisted by Circuit Operations Manager Richard Dearden and District Mission Enabler Neil Harland. As is so often the case, we discovered that other local Christians were simultaneously feeling similar promptings, and keen to work together. A common theme emerged



of need for a safe space for young people and a form of church which would make sense for them. Local people of peace seem keen to work with us. Sporting activities at the BBQ were organised by one of Dinnington Town FC's coaches. The local MP and newly appointed council Neighbourhood Coordinator joined us for the afternoon.

We don't yet know what our long-term presence in Dinnington will look like, but we will continue our ecumenical listening, networking and discernment through the autumn.

May we now hand what we have achieved so far to God, may his spirit continue to move and gather his disciples together, for we know nothing is impossible if it is of God.

We hold the congregation of Dinnington in our prayers,

As big decisions have to be made.

May Gods healing balm bring comfort,

and peace

May we also hold all our congregations and denominations
In prayer as we continue to explore this project
No matter how scary it may feel we know God goes
Before us, surrounds us, and will have our backs


