Transforming South Anston Methodist Church

About twenty years ago the idea of removing the pews and replacing the heating was suggested, to enable the church building to be used for other activities instead of only being used on a Sunday morning for the service. The heating was the first thing to be replaced, but because of the pews restricting the warm air flow it was not as efficient as it should be.

Forward to September 2024 and the transformation was complete. The pews had been removed and some sold to people in the village whilst others went off to be refurbished and found new homes. The pews have now been replaced by comfortable chairs. The floor has been sealed to prevent drafts and is now covered with a pleasing carpet. The heating is now much more efficient as there are no restrictions to the air flow which cuts down on the amount of gas being used.

A much-needed children's corner has been created and is proving to be a useful asset when small children are in a service. They now have somewhere to keep them occupied whilst parents can still be involved with the service.

The reaction received from our two open days when the public were welcome to come and view the new refurbishment has been very encouraging and we have already had enquiries from various avenues about the possibility of using the venue.

Hopefully, the future for South Anston Methodist Church is a positive one in the twenty first century where not only will we continue to preach the word of God but we are able to help the community in ways which previously we were unable to do.

The interview – Joy Fuller



Tell us a bit about yourself (egs where you live, working life, which Church attend)

I go to South Anston Church, which has been my 'home' since Woodsetts church closed during Covid. I have lived in Woodsetts for 34 years. I was born in Derbyshire and went to school in Alfreton. I went to college in Manchester and then to Bretton Hall. On leaving college I got married and went straight to Northern Ireland, just as 'The Troubles' were flaring. It was a very difficult environment to teach in, especially as I was English. I left in 1975 and went to South Wales. There I started my second career as a trainee chef. I met my second husband there and we started life in pub and clubs. I had many homes during this period and after working in many places we settled in Chesterfield at Walton golf club. Life was precarious and we had no settled home, so I started on career number three, and aged around 40, trained for 3 plus years as a nurse caring for people with learning disabilities. At this time I worked in Balderton Hospital, in Newark, an asylum of the old fashioned kind. It no longer exists. When it was closed down, I worked for NE Derbyshire NHS in a core and cluster unit in Eckington.

What's your favourite holiday destination and why?

It has to be Scotland. I love everything about it. I also love the moors of Northumberland. Beach Holidays are my idea of hell, as are hot places and cities.

What's your favourite music and book?

My favourite music is classical and Jazz. Books I like are meaty and provoke thought. I like historical thrillers. Something earthy and a bit bloodthirsty, currently S.G.Maclean. 17th century Scotland, is where I am currently immersed.

Tell us something about you that we don't know!

I had, and rode a motorbike, in all weathers, for pleasure and to get to work, until I was nearly 60.

What do you do to relax?

Garden, do cross stitch, listen endlessly to Radio 3, play the piano, or read. I don't like television, other than for the news. I spend too long each day reading The I Newspaper.

What does being a Christian/going to Church mean to you?

More now that I have got older. I was forced into 3 times every Sunday church attendance as a child and my Mother's family were avid Primitive Methodists. My father's family were not church goers. I am a hybrid. Spend many Sundays doing shift work and had my faith tested many times over the years. Always have strongly believed in God and loved the Old Testament. For some reason it is only since I retired, that I have felt comfortable with Jesus as the son of God. Teaching children 30 minutes of religion daily, and being examined in doing so, by Northern Irish ministers was gruelling. So much hate in that country at that time, that is made a mockery of the whole thing.

What do you find the most difficult things about being a Christian now?

Easy to answer. I like formal services, quality music, and a building where I can feel God's presence. Services can be too laid back for me now. I like a meaty sermon, where I learn something new, or get a different perspective on a well known theme. I feel too serious minded for the modern age. I was once accused of being 'Rubbish at small talk', and I admit to that.

What would be your message for the World in 10 words or less?

Use your skills and powers to do good, not harm.

From time to time we get asked about possible use of old/unused/out of date hymn books. Rev Angela recently noticed this Special request from the Music Association of the Methodist Church in Southern Africa

Encounter programme review

I wanted to share a brief update on something called the Encounter programme, you may have already heard of this but it is offered through the Connexion Learning and Development Team and I was part of the 2024 programme.

The Methodist Churc

I thought I'd start by sharing what Encounter is! In simple terms there are 3 key themes stated within the Encounter publicity:

- Ever wondered what God is calling you to?
- Would you like to have a greater impact as a Christian disciple?
- Invest in your faith journey in 2025: join with others on Encounter to explore your gifts and vocation.

It's a programme that runs throughout the year with evening Zoom sessions for a couple of hours once per month. Encounter is led by the Connexion Learning and Development team and includes many different aspects including speakers, discussions, presentations, bible readings and prayer. I very much enjoyed the variety of Encounter with no session being the same as the last, there were around 12 of us on the programme from across the UK and getting to know the rest of the group was one of the main benefits to me. I met some wonderful people and hearing their faith journey was inspiring and thought provoking. We were an eclectic group with a wide range of ages, gender and backgrounds – there was a rich amount of experience and knowledge.

I think all members of the programme had different hopes coming onto Encounter, some were exploring ordination, some considering Local preaching options and others (like me) just wanting to reflect, listen and see what God has to say about my Christian journey.

Each Encounter session had a focus and this included:

- The journey of discipleship
- Encountering God
- Encountering self
- Vocation
- Ministry
- Methodism
- Mission
- Pioneer Ministry
- The future

What did I learn!?

Well firstly I learnt a lot about Methodism and its history, we also had a session on the Methodist Way of Life and I have to admit having focused on that I did find it incredibly powerful (but challenging) and I'm determined to keep a focus on this 'Way of Life'.

With bible scripture sessions, prayer, devotions and talking to others I have certainly developed my knowledge of God more and learnt more about the bible. I found this element particularly refreshing.

The key for me though is back to the main aims of Encounter, thinking about calling, impact and faith journey. So what were my conclusions!

- 1. I feel I've grown as a Christian and have had affirmation of what my key skills are. I've ended the programme with a feeling that I'm in the right place (work, life, church) at the current time with my Christian journey.
- 2. I can't solve everything! This has always been a challenge for me and I at times feel the need to solve every problem and situation! I've felt a message of you can't do everything and I need to hand more to God, Matthew 11:28 has spoken to me strongly. I also need to recognise that God will only let me handle what He thinks I can cope with, I need to rely on the yoke more!
- 3. As many of you are aware my life is very busy with a lot going on in my personal life I've felt a nudge to carefully consider my life pattern and reassess priorities, I'm taking that challenge on into 2025!

Overall Encounter has been a fantastic programme and I'd wholeheartedly recommend to anyone looking for this kind of reflection, discernment and learning. Carlton news and updates

BOYS' BRIGADE AND GIRLS' ASSOCIATION

On Tuesday 24 Sept we had a walk near to the Church and Centre to look at the trees and it was the perfect time to see apples on the tree and collect conkers from the horse chestnut trees. We then considered the weather and played 'Catch the rain clouds'.

The Youth Harvest was held on 3 October when all the youth groups came together and brought gifts, which went to the Bassetlaw Food Bank, and we all shared in Rev Mark Orr's stone soup!

We joined the battalion at Hesley Woods for Adventure Day on Saturday 5 October. The activities we enjoyed included axe throwing, archery, zip wire, peddle cars and other things which we cannot normally attempt.

Most weeks we watch videos for our Christian education and this term these were about the miracles performed by Jesus. These have included healing the sick, turning water to wine and calming the storm.

On 8 October we had various games and made and ate mummy hot dogs, to complete our Egyptian themed programme from the previous term.

During the week before half term all the Brownies, Guides, BBGA and Rainbows members planted bowls of blue and purple bulbs as part of an educational programme 'Operation Purple Pinky' being partnered by Rotary and Boys' Brigade nationally.



As our next meeting was on Bonfire night, we saw fire safety videos and enjoyed sparklers in the back yard, and also made sensory lights.

On Remembrance Sunday, we joined in the Remembrance service at the war memorial. Erin and Finlay laid the BBGA wreath during the



ceremony. The war memorial bears the name of those in the village who died in the two world wars and recent conflicts. Many who live in Carlton find the name of their relatives on the memorial. These include Jenny Williamson.

Jenny came to the BBGA meeting the following Tuesday and she told us about her about her dad, Les, who was evacuated to Carlton from Norfolk as a boy in the war, and later returned to Carlton to marry her mum, Nora.

Les and Nora were important leaders in both our Church and BB.

We played 'Packing for Evacuation', 'Battle of Britain' and made spitfires for flying competitions and hand-painted poppies as we followed a WW2 theme.

We had to cancel the meeting on 19 November because of the snow, so we had our Enrolment evening on 26 November when we completed the WW2 theme and made paperchains with messages ready for our Christmas tree. All those present received their membership cards and all received service awards as they have completed between 1 and 4 years' service.

All the youth groups met together on Monday 2 December for a Christingle Celebration led by Rev Meg, and this closed following a visit from Geoff Lewis from Worksop Rotary, who explained how 'Operation Purple Pinky' was aimed at the elimination of Polio across the world. This was why they had been planting bulbs to give purple flowers. Members of the BBGA stayed late to plant four planters with

new crocuses for spring and decorate the BBGA Christmas tree. One of our leaders, Andreea, and her four boys were welcomed back to the Company following their long break in Suffolk and Romania. During our visit to Carlton Youth Centre on 10 December they received their membership cards and awards which they had earned, but had not received earlier in the year.

We completed the year by celebrating at our Christmas Party on 17 December, when Santa paid a visit and distributed selection boxes.

Wales Kiveton updates

Leading up to Christmas was a busy period with some exciting events taking place. Our Christmas Soup and Song in December was a wonderful festive occasion with a full church enjoying turkey and mince pies, singing, and lots of Christmas jumpers in evidence!

There were a few dignitaries present, which included the CEO of the charity Lost Chord, one of the councillors from RMBC, the Chairman from Wales Parish Council, and managers from Kiveton food hub and Greencore who both help us with some of our food supplies. Greencore even did a guest duet singing White Christmas, which everyone joined in with.

Due to storm Darragh the local primary school had to close that week due to a roof section blowing off, so it looked like the usual visit by 30 children to sing was cancelled, but two mums thought otherwise. So with a few other parents they brought 16 children to sing to almost 100 people as they didn't want to let us down. The head teacher approached Paul to ask if they could hold their two school Christmas concerts at our Church the following week because of the school roof problem, and swift arrangements were made to make this happen. Two concerts subsequently took place on separate days the week before Christmas and it was a wonderful sight to see. Proud parents and family that filled Wales Kiveton Church that might have otherwise missed all the hard work and the children's Christmas concert performances, with 100 children at each one.

The close cooperation between the school and our Church merited the story being featured in both the Rotherham Advertizer and The Star, and an article has been submitted to YourMag which should be out in the next edition, the story being about the Church that rescued the school Christmas concerts.

The full schedule and musicians for Soup and Song have been booked and arranged with Lost Chord through to December 2025, with one exception which will take place on Thursday 13th March. This is one that should be of special interest to all in the circuit and we would encourage you to attend to support one of our friendly Reverends, Philip MacDonald who will be playing at the March one. When Philip took our Christingle service he mentioned that the Retford Ukulele Group (RUGS) that he plays in could perform for a Soup and Song event, so without further ado we booked it in! I know Philip and his group have performed at The Grove and I think Hallcroft, so why not come and see him and his ukulele band at Wales Kiveton Soup and Song where you'll receive a warm welcome. All sessions start at 12 noon through until 2pm

Our local community and some businesses have recognised the value of the Soup and Song to our community, and we were pleased and delighted to receive a brand new mini oven and dual hob from Greencore which was presented at the January event.

The local Kiveton Co op have chosen Wales Kiveton as one of their three good community causes to support for this project and will award us with a minimum of £1.000 over 12 months, but this could be more if Co op members tag our Soup and Song as their preferred cause; so if you are a Co op member it doesn't matter if you don't live local to Wales Kiveton, you can still log on and select us please!

In addition a neighbouring village have formed a "village choir" called Harthill Voices, and they generously donated £300 towards Soup and Song from a concert they held in Harthill. They are very taken with our efforts and want to help further, so following discussions together, they will be presenting a concert of songs at Wales Kiveton Church on the evening of Friday May 9th to commemorate VE Day of 80 years with some of the proceeds going towards both Church and Soup and Song.

Wales Parish Council's recognition of our community involvement led to the council asking Paul Joynes some months ago if he would carry out the honour of switching on the villages Christmas lights. This was accepted humbly and as a privilege to have been discussed and agreed at a council meeting.

Wales Community Theatre Players have been rehearsing very hard over the last few months at Wales Kiveton in preparation for their Pantomime Cinderella being presented at the refurbished Montgomery Hall in Sheffield. Some of us watched the Sunday matinee in January and it is certainly worth all the effort as it was excellent; the Ugly Sisters were very funny with stupendous costumes. The only drawback was that Tom Ingall the Look North presenter as one half of the Ugly Sisters picked Paul Joynes out as his "love interest" for the whole performance. Oh yes he did!

No sooner do they finish their pantomime season they are already scheduling rehearsal dates for using our church again to prepare for their next production which will also be held at the Montgomery Hall from Thursday 17th to Sunday 20th July. Be sure to get your tickets booked well in advance for the most entertaining of shows, SHREK THE MUSICAL!

Our ecumenical links and relationships continue to be uplifting, and a social evening was held at Wales Kiveton one evening where we shared food together, then had a fun quiz followed by "Play your cards right". Our relationships have been building and growing since we began meeting together some years ago, and there is an overwhelming sense of closeness and friendship, with a sharing of faith that is the foundation of our commitment to Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Yet again the church was filled with people from our community & our space was used in another way. St Swithun's C of E Primary Academy did two performances of their Key Stage 1 Christmas Nativity. privilege to share it with them & their families.


